Following amendments have been made in the Annexure I to GIL CSR Policy as agreed by CSR Committee and approved by the Board

Amount allocated to Institute Of Road Traffic Education (IRTE) towards its project on road safety has been increased by INR 5.59 Lakhs. Amount allocated to International Association for Human Values (IAHV) towards its project on sanitation and hygiene has been increased by INR 1.15 Lakhs. Amount allocated for administrative expenses has been reduced by INR 6.74 Lakhs.

Activity of providing safe drinking water facility in Dhanora panchayat under IAHV project has been replaced by construction of toilets facilities for the needy villagers. In total 300 toilets will be constructed in 2 panchayats of Ghanegaon in Aurangabad district, and Urad in Amravati district of Maharashtra.

Institute Of Road Tra	ffic Education (IRTE) - Goodyear : Safer Roads, Safer You Initiative
Thematic area	"promoting education, including special education and employment enhancing vocational skills especially among children, women, elderly,
	and the differently abled and livelihood enhancement projects"
Detailed description	The project "Goodyear-IRTE Driver Training Programme for Fleet Operators" aims to provide training to 5400 drivers of taxi cabs in Delhi NCR, Mumbai and Bengaluru in financial year 2017-18. The total cost of the project is INR. 2,93,79,723 The project has been in existence since 2015-16.
	The provisional data provided by the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways, Government of India has revealed the disturbing trend of yet another increase of road deaths from 1,39,671 in 2014 to 1,46,133 persons killed in 2015. This translates to a social loss of over 2% of India's GDP estimated at Rs. 1 Lakh Crore annually. In India, the highest number of fatalities, constituting 26.4% was those of two wheeler riders. Passengers of light motor vehicles constituted 24.7% of the total fatalities, making this category the second highest in fatal road crashes in the country.
	Much of this has been attributed to inadequate investment in training and

assessment of drivers of these vehicles due to following factors:

- Poor working conditions and low pay scales relative to alternate careers which does not attract well-qualified drivers
- Majority of players in the road transport industry are small entrepreneurs with limited investment capability who are more focussed on getting immediate results on their top and bottom line

Moreover, while on one hand metro and tier-2 cities in India are experiencing growth of large organized taxi service providers, passengers, especially women, are increasingly feeling insecure to travel in these cabs after a number of rape/molestation/harassment incidents have been reported in last few years.

In the previous years training was provided to 7422 drivers through 415 workshops in Delhi, Gurgaon, Faridabad, Noida and Mumbai. Safer Roads, Safer You Initiative was covered in majority of the newspapers and journals. Project created goodwill in the ministry and government.

To engage with the beneficiaries post training, a reminder mechanism has been integrated into the project wherein one road safety tip is sent to drivers every fortnight through SMS.

As part of the project, National Conference for Safer and Convenient Taxi Operations in India was organised. This Conference was conducted in association with the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways, where around 100 delegates participated. A short film was also developed to create awareness amongst taxi drivers. The video will be used for training purpose.

Keeping the learning from previous years, the following steps have been taken

- Looking at the demand of trainings the number of workshops has been increased to 270, with 5400 drivers involving small taxi operators.
- To create a long term impact on beneficiaries the reminder mechanism will be continued which engage beneficiaries over the period of time via SMS based driving tips.
- Video will be used in training drivers. Further emphasis on "women safety" will be continued in the training
- Bengaluru, the third most populous city and fifth most populous urban agglomeration with more than 1.3 lakhs taxi on roads, will be added as one of the locations covered under the project
- Workshop / conference / event to support long term capacity building
 of road safety in the country has been proposed with different
 stakeholders. Under this 10 workshops on a pilot basis will be
 organized for 200 driving licensing officers to sensitize and build their
 capacity on road safety. A national conference cum workshop will also
 be organized.

The aim of the project will be to:

a. Support the government towards the development of a safe, efficient and reliable public transport service, in order to build trust and faith in the common citizen using taxi services in the urban areas of India.

Detailed description	The Indian Government has prioritized Swacch Bharat Abhiyan, Central governments ambitious project for elimination of open defecation in the			
	country as one of its objectives. Maharashtra alone has around 57 lakh			
	rural families whose homes do not have toilets. The water supply and			
	sanitation ministry of the state stated that according to a survey in 2012,			

a total of 65.15.718 families did not have toilets of their own. However, in 2013-14, a total of 5,59,042 toilets were constructed and in the subsequent financial year, 2,64,716, were built, taking the total number of toilets constructed to 8,23,758. It has prepared a plan to construct 56,91,960 toilets for the remaining families till 2019. Given the focus of the government and need in the community, Goodyear in collaboration with International Association for Human Values (IAHV) started the project in 2015-16 with an aim to initiate a community led, sustainable transformation process in nine villages of five districts rural Maharashtra on sanitation with a long term objective of creating open defecation free (ODF) villages. In the first year, the project was undertaken by GIL along with GSATPL having a total cost of INR 2,43,92,190. GIL contributed INR 1,16,10,645 towards the programme for construction of 294 individual household toilets across 9 villages. Rest of the fund was provided by GSATPL. In 2016-17, the project was continued to be supported by GSATPL with the objective to build upon the work done in phase I to ensure that the beneficiaries continued to use the toilets that were built for them and mobilize them to take charge of development processes of their villages. As a result 6 villages have been declared ODF. Capacity building of villages has led to start of many developmental initiatives in villages including infrastructural improvements, chemical-free farming, e-learning, watershed management, improved hygiene and cleanliness, freedom from addictions. In 2017-18, the project will be scaled up to 2 panchayats with an aim to construct toilets, undertake an awareness campaign to sensitize the villagers on sanitation and hygiene related issues and bring a shift in their attitude and behavior against open defecation. A small amount will be set aside for maintenance of toilets constructed in Phase 1 on need basis with the provision of using the unutilized amount on other project activities by the end of the project period. The project this year will be jointly undertaken by GIL and GSATPL.
